## Pastor Kropa's Message.....

#### ATTENDANCE IN CHURCH?

Perhaps you've noticed the attendance pads at the end of each pew in church. Maybe you've even filled one out once or twice. Most likely you never saw the need, or even thought it was a complete waste of your time. After all, why does anyone need to know you were in church that Sunday?

That's true. We don't really need to know who was in church on any particular Sunday. But, you see, that's not really why we have those pads. They're not to tell us who was there, but instead who wasn't. Maybe a little story will help explain. In his book "5 Keys For Church Leaders," Kevin Martin writes about an experience he once had while serving as the rector of an Episcopal parish out in Ohio...

In the parish I served in Ohio, I was glad to have a new family join our church. After a year, I noticed that they were attending less frequently. Then one day, while reviewing the parish list, I remembered that I had not seen them for what seemed like two months. One afternoon I stopped by their house to visit. I noticed the grass in the yard was uncut and the screen door was torn. The wife greeted me with hesitancy, but she did invite me in and offered me coffee. Finally, after some chit-chat, I said that I had noticed that they were not around and wondered if there was a problem. I added that I missed them.

The young mother told me something that I have never forgotten. "Kevin," she said, looking directly at me, "we have not been to church for six months, since my husband left me... It is hard for me to believe that we could be gone for six months and that only now you have missed us."

She was absolutely right, Martin conceded.

Now the problem was not that he was a bad priest. Or even that the people of his congregation were uncaring. It was simply that most churches do not have any process or mechanism for tracking worship attendance. Again, not to tell them who *has* worshiped, but rather to identify who *hasn't* so that the pastor and other members can reach out to these folks to see if everything is alright. Most of the time, it probably is. They've just been away on a trip or vacation and didn't tell anyone. But sometimes there is an underlying issue why they haven't been in church; a serious illness, family tragedy, or financial setback, like the loss of a job. And it's *those* people the congregation needs to be aware of before it's too late, and they – like that young wife in Ohio – feel as though nobody cares.

So the next time you're in church, take a moment and fill out that pad at the end of the pew. It's not the best way to track who isn't in church, and in the future we may want to explore other options. But it's all that we have for now. And it will only work if EVERYONE signs in so we can have an accurate picture of who is and, more importantly, who isn't in church that Sunday.

As the Hope family, we want to know if someone has a problem or is in need. And, sometimes, the only clue that something's wrong is by noting their absence. Think about it. Then think about how it would feel if no one noticed that you were gone. And then help us avoid this by filling out that pad on Sunday mornings. We're always glad to see you in worship. It's those who aren't there we especially want to identify. Thanks!

# CROP WALK, Sunday, October 15 @ 1:30 PM Sign up to walk.....

The CROP Walk will be held on Sunday, October 15<sup>th</sup> at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 33 Throckmorton Street, with registration at 1:30 PM and the Walk stepping off at 2 PM. Walkers may participate until 4 PM. The walk begins and ends at the church, with a 2.8 mile route and a mini-route available.

CWS also responds to disasters in the U.S. like Hurricanes Irma, Harvey, Sandy, and Matthew. Your support of the CROP Hunger Walk forms the foundation of all Church World Service work and affords CWS the flexibility to respond as needed when disasters strike. In fact, last year CROP funds enabled CWS to respond to Hurricane Matthew in Eastern North Carolina with long-term recovery work.

Right now, over 100,000 kits are being sent to Hurricane Harvey affected areas and 30,000 CWS Hygiene Kits are on the way to our partners at the American Red Cross to be in position for immediate response to Hurricane Irma.

# Wednesday Evening Worship and Wednesday Church School @ 7 PM

Church School is the same as Sunday School. Come to Sunday School on Wednesday evening if you cannot attend on Sunday mornings. **GRACE** is undeserved favor, according to Martin Luther: things, gifts, blessings etc. that we receive that we haven't necessarily earned. In a certain sense, it describes history including where we find ourselves today. **HOPE** is the desire for things, or conditions, not yet attained, and as such, looks more to the future, based on the present.

As we enter the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter of 2017, we look back and acknowledge how fortunate our congregation is, both financially and functionally. It is perhaps fortuitous that with the installation of Pastor Ed, we complete our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and begin our next 50(?) years of ministry.

I have been told that what we are (as a congregation and individually) is God's gift to us. What we DO with those gifts is our gift, returned to God. It is with this in mind that we should consider our own generosity in time, effort and money to determine what we want to do in 2018. You have no doubt read about the history of God's people in the Bible: how he continues to shower riches on them and us. So.....what is to be your response this year?

The most important contribution you can make to our ministry is the donation of your time and abilities. During 3 Sundays in October we will be reviewing the Ministries of Hope. John Bonanno, Angelo Ranaudo and I will each have about 5 minutes to review them. The Council is now considering the 2018 Spending Plan proposal and at our November Congregational meeting we will adopt it.

We gain insight into ministry by reviewing how we spend our money. It is the fuel that powers what we do. Consider the following analysis of the proposed spending plan:

- 6% for Action: (outward and inward)
- 16 % for Worship
- 39 % for Education

- 8 % for Administration
- 29 % for Maintenance and Capital Improvements

As you consider YOUR participation in the Church's ministry we will ask you to be generous, particularly with your time. We hope to do more within our community and for the Church in general, but we need your support and guidance. In late October we will also distribute estimate of giving and participation forms, to be returned at the Congregational meeting, Sunday, November 12. The Council will use this information to shape our ministry in 2018. THANKS FOR YOUR SUPPORT! **John Drager, Support Chair**

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# Freehold Area Open Door Report by Sandy Taylor, Trustee & VP

In July, Open Door supplied a three-day amount of food to 656 people. This was 93 people less than last July. We have received a great deal of produce from the Master Gardeners of Monmouth County, two community gardens as well as other gardeners. The clients are happy with the fresh produce.



**S**ome cash donations were: Macy's Matching Gift of \$946.00; Schwab Charitable Foundation, \$1,150.00; Clayton and McGirr Funeral Home, \$1,295.00; Macy's Bag of Hunger Campaign, \$2,549.00; Dr. & Mrs. Rosenberg, \$1,000.00 and a volunteer, \$1,100.00.

**O**ur Advocacy Director, Erika Woods, assisted 13 clients with utilities totaling \$3,366.26; ten clients with \$3000.00 in rent; six clients with gas. She was also able

to secure housing for a single woman who was referred by Hope Lutheran. Besides providing financial assistance, Erika advocated for clients' medical needs, homelessness, veterans affairs, social services issues and unemployment.

The Food Bank has changed its name to **FULFILL**, part of a change that highlights the many options for assistance. Other programs are: Kids Feeding Program, Mobile Pantries, Culinary Training, Tax Refund assistance, affordable Healthcare, and other hunger fighting programs. **Thank you** is extended to everyone for bringing the food to fill Hope's food box. It is appreciated. Remember to bring toiletry items that you pick up at motels when on vacation.

Our After School Program has 24 children, with 20 adults and 20 high school volunteers

 $oldsymbol{Y}$ ears ago Lutheran missionaries were sent to start new churches around the world. and now those churches run their own seminaries and ministries. What, then, is the role of the ELCA missionary today? Today's missionaries are doctors, nurses. teachers, educators and community organizers—and the ELCA sends them to work alongside other Lutherans only when an invitation is issued by one of the ELCA's global companion churches. "Instead of approaching us for long-term people to help start and grow a church, (our global companions) are asking us to fill more specific technical positions," said Heidi Torgerson, ELCA director for global service. "Our fractured world needs healing. ELCA missionaries are agents of healing through the work they do." Adrainne Gray and her husband, Ben, for example, are missionaries working in technical positions as communicators for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land.

Whether they are taking photos, writing stories or preparing press releases, their charge is to connect the English-speaking Lutheran world to the reality of life for Arab Lutherans in Palestine, Jerusalem and Jordan. "The amazing thing is that (in spite of the conflict), our co-workers are joyful, hopeful people," Adrainne said. "They are living."

While the majority of ELCA missionaries are in their 20s, early 30s or close to retirement, the Grays are in the middle of their careers and raising their 14- and 11-year-old kids. They came to Jerusalem after Adrainne completed her training as a deaconess in 2015 and was looking for a call.

"We didn't have this part of the world on our radar at all, but when we saw the opening, we knew immediately that our talents fit its need," she said. "We wear the term 'missionary' proudly—it's central to the work of the church.


