

## **DIETRICH BONHOEFFER**

Both our current political landscape, as well as the recent theatrical movie depicting his life, have worked together to prompt renewed interest in the life and theology of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. But who was he?

"Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-1945) was a German pastor, theologian, ecumenist, and peace activist. He wrote profoundly about Christian faith, community, grace, and ethics, centered on the question, 'Who is Christ for us today?' The unspeakable human suffering resulting from the atrocities of the Nazi Regime compelled him into church resistance and, finally, political resistance culminating in a conspiracy against that regime aimed at installing a new government that would end the war and those atrocities. Imprisoned during the last two years of his life, Bonhoeffer was

executed just weeks before the end of the war. "

(from the introduction to the course "Lessons from Dietrich Bonhoeffer")

During Lent this year I have been focusing on Bonhoeffer during my Daily Devotions, Tuesday through Saturday, each week. We are also embarking on a three-week class on the life, theology, and relevance of Bonhoeffer for us today. Each week, I will be recording a session based on the slides and scripts that were produced and written by Dr. Lori Brandt Hale. She is a professor in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Augsburg University in Minneapolis, Minnesota. She is also the current President of the International Bonhoeffer Society-English Language Section.

I have already recorded the first session and Josh is in the process of uploading it to Hope's website, along with the PowerPoint slides that Dr. Brandt Hale has created to go along with each week's presentation. Perhaps this will be available online by the time you read this. Or, at least, shortly thereafter.

We then will also use the time between the worship services on Sunday mornings to have a conversation discussing that particular week's presentation. There will be a participant's handout available each week as well.

Here is the schedule:

- Week One (Sunday, March 30): "Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Life: 10 Key Turning Points"
- Week Two (Sunday, April 6): "Bonhoeffer's Theology"
- Week Three (Sunday, April 13): "Why Bonhoeffer? Why Now?"

Also, on Wednesday, April 9 there will be an in-person midweek worship service, utilizing some of Bonhoeffer's most memorable teachings and reflections. I have chosen to do this on April 9 because that day is the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Bonhoeffer's death.

Even after 80 years, Dietrich Bonhoeffer remains a towering figure in Christian theology. And his stance against the evils of Nazi Germany serve to inspire Christians to this very day.

I hope you will be able to join us!

#### March 17, 2025 Council Meeting

Those present were as follows: Michelle, Bill, Matt M, Pastor Ed, Sarah, Sue, Jess. Mike D was also present for his report. Pastor Ed began the meeting with a prayer.

**Approval of February Minutes:** Motion to approve the February Minutes was made by Sue, second by Matt M. Motion carried.

**HCS Report:** Judy sent in the February HCS newsletter.

**Treasurer's report:** Mike shared the treasurer's report. He shared that based on preliminary counts, the past 3 Sundays have brought in about \$55,000 in offerings. Mike asks if the

council would advise the 'extra' funds from the checking account be moved somewhere else to collect more interest. If we move it to the Mission Investment Savings, we would collect a 2.5% interest, we could get higher interest if we moved some to a CD. Mike and Bill will ask the finance committee for a recommendation, for the council to vote on next month, or electronically.

\*\*Audit Committee nominations from council or finance committee, reach out to accountant, look to Synod guidance for 'model audit'.

**Pastor's Report:** Pastor Kropa submitted his report. See also: Generis update in Old Business

Pastor attended a continuing education day ("Hope in a Divided World"),

Pastor and Josh are working on a "Lessons from Dietrich Bonhoeffer in a House Divided and a World on Fire" course for discussion between services.

Can we incorporate the other 4 goals of the HGH initiative into council positions/responsibilities? Add them into the agenda every month to keep them in mind, and show what we are doing for each goal. *Bring ideas for this to the May meeting / discuss with Pastor*. In addition to the proposed 'New Member coordinator'?

#### **Old Business:**

Generis. First Fruits summary / update status report. (Pastor / Sue).

The first few weeks have seen a great increase in offerings, and first time gifts.

The commitment total is \$533,443.61 for the 2 years. Thank you letters from Advanced Commitment have been sent out, the rest of the thank yous will be sent soon.

Family units will be given updates on their commitment and giving. Sue will be creating a monthly report and sharing it with the team and Carla to check in on the commitments.

Architectural designs. Continuing to drive to a council consensus.

Matt M has rendered 3 drawings of our top options, Bill generated some round numbers for the projected costs. According to some research, \$300 a sq/ft seems reasonable, giving the 3 options a range from \$1.035 mil - 1.365 mil. Refining of designs will fix and issue with missing hallways, and potentially add a warming kitchen and or storage space.

#### **New Business:**

Council assignments: New / Member Coordinator +. \*\* Add this into Pastor's idea for incorporating the HGH goals into council responsibilities.

Approval of ITAK cleaning of all split units: \$6,760.00

Hope will need to choose representatives to the NJ Synod Assembly (June 5-7) E Brunswick Hilton.

Pastor Ed closed the meeting with prayer at 8:40. Next meeting will be 4/21.


