

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A COMMA MAKES!

"Most of the time, travelers worry about their luggage." vs.

"Most of the time travelers worry about their luggage."

Just exactly who's worried about their luggage? Travelers or

time travelers?

"We're going to learn to cut and paste kids!"

VS.

"We're going to learn to cut and paste, kids!" Are we learning how to cut and paste kids?

Or simply encouraging kids that *they're* going to learn how to cut and paste?

"Let's eat, grandpa." vs. "Let's eat grandpa."

(Punctuation can potentially save lives. Especially those of grandfathers!)

Finally, an English professor once wrote on the chalkboard the following words: "A woman without her man is nothing" and then asked his students to punctuate it correctly.

All the male students wrote:

"A woman, without her man, is nothing."
However, all the female students in the class wrote:

"A woman: without her, man is nothing."

COMMAS MAKE A HUGE DIFFERENCE!

Even in the Bible:

He himself granted that some are apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ...

Ephesians 4:11-12

Because the ancient New Testament manuscripts did not include punctuation, it had to be added *later*. But, as we just saw, especially in that example of male and female college students, exactly *where* you place that punctuation can have a profound impact on what is actually being communicated.

In verse 11, above, we read that Christ apparently intended that there be individuals called to certain leadership positions within the church. So far so good. No problem here.

But then in verse 12, we read exactly *what* these church leaders are called to do. And this is where it gets really interesting. Because in the much beloved and influential King James Version of the Bible – many people still to this day say that it's their favorite translation – there is actually an *extra comma* that's been added. And that use of an extra comma has profoundly affected how we view the role of pastors and other leaders in the church for over 400 years now.

Verse 12 in the King James Bible reads as follows: "to equip the saints" – *comma* – "for the work of ministry" – *comma* – "for building up the body of Christ..."

In other words, there are three separate tasks described here:

- 1. Equipping the saints
- 2. The work of ministry, and
- 3. Building up the body of Christ.

Did you catch it? Snuggled in there, right between equipping the saints and building up the body of Christ, is the expectation – at least in the King James Version – that apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers are called to *do* the work of ministry. Apparently, all by themselves, in fact!

But all of the more recent translations of the Bible – which are based on additional ancient manuscripts that simply were not available when the King James Version was produced in the 17th century – translate verse 12: "to equip the saints for the work of ministry" – *comma* – "for building up the body of Christ…"

Do you see it? Instead of *three* tasks or responsibilities assigned to pastors and the other leaders in the church, there are now only *two*:

- 1. To equip the saints for the work of ministry, and
- 2. For building up the body of Christ.

Two, not three. And, most importantly, notice here that the work of ministry is not something that only *pastors* and other church leaders do. Instead, the work of ministry is something we *all* share as baptized Christians. You see, for each and every one of us, our *baptism* is our call to participate in the work of ministry.

It's not something that only those who are ordained can or should do. It's something that all of the baptized are called to *share in*!

Or to put it another way, the role of the pastor is not to do the work of ministry singlehandedly, as we've been inclined to think about it for the past few hundred years — ever since the publication of the King James Bible. Rather, the primary responsibility of the pastor is to equip *others* to use their own gifts for ministry as well.

Pastors, as baptized Christians themselves, are certainly called to do the work of ministry. But they're not called to do it alone! We are all in this together.

Therefore, the church is not the place where Christians come to receive ministry. It's the place where all the baptized come to be equipped for ministry. And then sent out into the world to use their unique gifts and talents in service to God, and in service to others. We are called to be participants, not simply recipients. All of us!

Now, of course, we always have a choice, of course, in *how* we serve. But not *if* we serve.

Earlier in Ephesians 4, Paul wrote: "I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the *calling* to which you have been *called*... But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift."

In other words, we've all been *gifted*; differently to be sure. But we've all been gifted. Then we are *called* through our baptism. And, finally, in the church we are *equipped* to serve in Christ's name *using* those gifts.

So when Bill Unger spoke in church last Sunday asking for "volunteers," what he was really asking is for every member of Hope to discover their unique giftedness. And then find a way to best use that gift in order to serve.

Someone once made a wall hanging for me with the following words on it: "What you are is God's gift to *you*... What you become is your gift to *God*.

And that, my fellow Christians, is what using our God-given gifts for the work of ministry is all about.

**Mike is also recommending that counting should be added to council member's responsibilities next year. Then we'll have more counters, and we can break up the family pairs. Sarah makes a motion to move 200k into a 1 year CD with the Mission Investment Fund. Dave second, motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Kropa will circulate his report later in the week.

Giving numbers are still ahead of budget, thanks to the initial boost from the One Fund starting.

Old Business:

Generis. Update / status report. (Pastor / Sue).

Architectural update: The 3 plans we brainstormed are doable, they would just need tweaking from the pros. From their perspective, the costs would be closer to \$400 a squarefoot than our lower estimates.

The 3 plans would range from about \$1.5 to \$1.8 to 2.1 mil. at \$400 per square foot. At \$350 per, it would be \$1.3, 1.56, 1.83. Plus site fees and soft costs (\$300k + \$58k ?)

(A question about 4 classrooms with no MP was brought up \sim \$1.2 - 1.36 mil)

We also need to keep in mind the placement of the multi room, if we box in the playground we would need to be sure that we don't want to make it bigger in the future. Some previous plans had the MP room at an angle to line up with the property line to put a little more space in that middle area.

We'll need to also consider updating our electrical to maybe a second panel, as well as the sewers, sanitary, and groundwater concerns.

New Business:

The question was asked, Should we keep and continue to maintain the air purifiers? Look into any other options that could reduce costs.

Revist in May: 25-26 draft budget. Finance Committee final update for Council's Approval.

Update Lighting in Parking lot: Bill makes a motion to approve *Corbin* to replace and update the lights for \$5940. Michelle seconds, motion carried.

Adjournment with a prayer at 8:40.




